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MESSAGE FROM THE CHIEF ADMINISTRATOR

As the Chief Administrator of the Civilian Office of Police Accountability (COPA), leading COPA through a pandemic and the civil unrest this City has undergone following the death of Mr. George Floyd in Minneapolis presented unique challenges that required significant real-time investigative adjustments, and strategic and operational modifications. As we conclude the third quarter of 2020 as reflected in this report, COPA continues to serve the public with dedication to deliver services to the residents of this great city, Chicago.

The Civilian Office of Police Accountability's **mission** is to:

- Provide a just and efficient means to fairly and timely conduct investigations within our jurisdiction;
- Determine whether allegations of police misconduct are well-founded;
- Identify and address patterns of police misconduct; and
- Make policy recommendations to improve the Chicago Police Department, thereby reducing incidents of police misconduct.

Our **vision** is to be the leader in police accountability by conducting thorough investigations to advance the culture of policing and build trust in civilian oversight.

I believe it is important to note that when our mission and vision were developed, many of the conditions we now face did not exist. Nevertheless, COPA's highly trained staff have demonstrated a willingness and an unwavering commitment to fulfill our mandates. COPA, sharing its experience with stakeholders throughout the country, from cities seeking to develop police oversight bodies to national elected officials seeking to institute federal legislation, serves to underpin others' recognition of COPA as a leader in police accountability. The complaints received, investigations completed, community engagement activities conducted, and lessons learned during these unprecedented times has led us to expand our major incident response unit, which we can dispatch to swiftly investigate the most egregious complaints of misconduct when civil unrest occurs.

COPA has also continued to inform the public of our investigative activities. Our commitment to transparency is demonstrated through the issuance of regular press updates and social media statements, the frequent posting of complaint data and the release of video related to use of force incidents, particularly Officers' use of deadly force on our website, and numerous community presentations. Our dedication to transparency and ability to share updates and relevant information with the public have certainly cultivated better relationships with residents as we continue to build trust established over the past three years.

On behalf of the City of Chicago's Civilian Office of Police Accountability, I am pleased to present the third quarter report (Q3) for 2020. This report provides data and analysis of COPA's investigative work, and updates on strategic operational initiatives from July 1, 2020 to September 30, 2020. INTRODUCTION

The Civilian Office of Police Accountability (COPA) is responsible for receiving all complaints of police misconduct involving the Chicago Police Department (Department) and its members, and investigating complaints involving excessive force, domestic violence, coercion, verbal abuse, unlawful search or seizure, and unlawful denial of counsel. COPA also receives notifications of and investigates certain types of incidents including all officer involved firearm discharges, all officer involved deaths, custodial deaths, Taser discharges resulting in serious injury or death, and any incident involving an officer that results in serious bodily injury or death.

COPA is pleased to provide quarterly and annual report updates on its performance. This report provides information concerning operations and summary statistical data on investigative work from July 1, 2020 through September 30, 2020. To learn more, please visit www.chicagocopa.org.

OPERATIONAL UPDATES

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

COPA is guided by our core principles of **I**ntegrity, **T**ransparency, **I**ndependence and **T**imeliness. As we work to build upon these pillars, our Public Affairs team continues to forge a strong commitment to community engagement and outreach. Our growth can be measured through increased engagement metrics and enhanced community interaction. The team is actively engaging with our city's stakeholders, concerned citizens and most-impacted residents, educating the community-at-large on COPA's role in providing a safe and secure city for all.


While the COVID-19 pandemic has impacted how we go about our daily lives, the Public Affairs team promptly and seamlessly pivoted to a virtual community engagement model. Through this model, we have continued to build COPA's mission of providing robust and thorough community engagement. In Q3 COPA met virtually with more than 20 organizations addressing a cross section of Chicagoans from across the city's 18 wards and police districts, the City of Philadelphia and the National Association of Civilian Oversight of Law Enforcement as well as members of the Chicago Police Department.

As we continue to enhance and grow our virtual outreach model, we are committed to engaging in extensive outreach to our city's various civic leaders, the faith-based community, violence interrupters, and other stakeholders as we look to amplify COPA's footprint in Chicago. In addition to our work locally, COPA has continued to participate in conversations at the national level regarding the future of civilian oversight.


Virtual Community Meetings

As police oversight advances into the forefront of many political and social conversations, COPA is using our platform and robust knowledge base to lead many of these discussions. In August, COPA participated in a virtual meeting of the Street Leader Social Justice Panel, a group of 50 youth leaders

committed to increasing youth participation in social justice. This is part of our growing youth engagement initiative, focused on educating youth on the various legal concepts involved in a police misconduct investigation. Additionally, COPA served as a panelist during the 2020 NACOLE Conference, participating in a conversation regarding the school to prison pipeline.

Locally, COPA participated in numerous town halls with elected officials and community groups, with many of these meetings being specifically focused on police oversight. Meetings such as a town hall with Budget Chairman Pat Dowell, whose ward encompasses parts of the city's south side; and Alderman Samantha Nugent, whose northwest ward is home to many residents at the forefront in the fight of increased oversight. Through meeting with these various constituencies, COPA continues to take valuable community input back to our team to enrich and further develop our strategies and policies.

COPA's commitment to Consent Decree compliance is steadfast, and our staff regularly participates in public meetings related to ongoing compliance efforts. In August, Public Affairs staff participated in a public hearing before the Committee on Public Safety to comment on COPA's goals and commitments in achieving this compliance. In addition to this public hearing, COPA also attended and monitored community listening sessions, hosted by Consent Decree Judge Robert Dow, regarding the death of George Floyd and the status of policing.

Case Liaison Outreach

Building on COPA's commitment to transparency and engagement, COPA's Case Liaison, responsible for supporting persons who have filed police misconduct complaints or have been impacted by police use of force, continued to keep them abreast of their investigation, answer questions and provide support through the investigative process. Whether this is the family of an individual subject to an officer-involved shooting or a citizen who has filed a misconduct complaint, COPA's Case Liaisons are committed to providing timely and informative updates on COPA's ongoing cases.

In addition to reaching out to those most impacted by a developing investigation, Case Liaisons are responsible for contacting and building relationships with local community stakeholders in areas where an incident may have taken place. This is one of the many ways COPA works to provide clear and factual information in the aftermath of traumatic incident.

Engagement via Media Outlets

COPA's Public Affairs team has been working diligently to inform members public and the media on the status of many of our high-profile cases. This past quarter, we released 19 press releases updating the public on developments or conclusions of prominent cases. Excerpts from several of these major cases include:

- ### **COPA Recommends Officer be Separated from the Chicago Police Departments**

...The Civilian Office of Police Accountability (COPA) recommends Chicago Police Officer Saharat Sampim be separated from the Chicago Police Department on multiple allegations of making false statements. The Department has concurred with COPA's recommendation and findings.

Officer Sampim's false statements stem from the August 2014 fatal officer involved shooting (OIS) of Mr. Roshad McIntosh. In October 2019, after re-opening the investigation, COPA released a summary report of the officer involved shooting supporting the initial investigation's finding as within Department policy. However, after an exhaustive review of all relevant videos, forensic data, witness statements (civilian and sworn), and documentary evidence associated with the fatal shooting, COPA determined a parallel investigation into the truthfulness of Officer Sampim's statements was warranted...

- **COPA Provides Update on Investigation of Officer Using Homophobic Slur**

...The Civilian Office of Police Accountability (COPA) has concluded its investigation of a member of the Chicago Police Department who used a homophobic slur, which was captured on video during a protest following the death of George Floyd... Following the incident which occurred June 1, 2020, COPA recommended, and the Superintendent agreed to relieve the involved officer of his police powers during the pendency of COPA's investigation...

- **COPA Provides Update on Officer Involved Shooting at the 25th District**

...Today the Civilian Office of Police Accountability (COPA) responded to an officer involved shooting at the 25th District Police Station. Preliminary investigative efforts have determined a Chicago Police Officer transported a detainee who then discharged his weapon wounding two officers. Three officers returned fire also wounding the offender during the exchange.

COPA's investigation into the use of force is already underway. Responding COPA investigative personnel have begun reviewing body worn camera and gathering other evidence and relevant materials...

- **COPA Releases Video of Fatal Officer Involved Shooting Near 4800 S. Laverne Within 26 Days of the Incident**

...Materials posted on COPA's website are being made available 26 days after the incident. Today's release is consistent with COPA's commitment to transparency and in advance of the City's 60-Day Video Release Policy. Materials include numerous body-worn footage, OEMC transmission and 911 calls, as well as Case Incident and Tactical Response Reports which can be viewed by visiting <https://www.chicagocopa.org/case/2020-4177/>.

Early reports indicate officers from the 8th District responded to the area in search of a suspect believed to have stabbed an individual. Officers located an individual matching the description in Vittum Park and repeatedly gave commands to drop the knife. Officers deployed a Taser to subdue the individual temporarily to no avail.

The individual then attacked one of the officers and proceeded to stab her numerous times. Two officers fired their weapons, fatally wounding the individual. The officer who was stabbed was wearing a protective ballistic vest and not seriously injured...

Engagement via Social Media

As social media continues to grow as a primary source of information for many individuals, COPA is working to grow our online presence and outreach methods to reach those who may no longer rely on traditional sources of information. On our social media pages, we post investigative statistical reports, career opportunities, instructions on how to file a complaint, quarterly report information, press statements and other valuable information.



COPA'S Response & Engagement Efforts following the Protests in Response to the Death of George Floyd and Jacob Blake

As the City of Chicago and our country continue to deal with unrest surrounding the police killing of George Floyd and shooting of Jacob Blake, COPA continues to receive an increased number of complaints from protest activities. In May, COPA implemented specific measures to ensure staff can handle this increase.

Strategically COPA:

1. Created a specialized team of investigative personnel to review and respond to complaints in real-time;

2. Coordinated with the Cook County State's Attorney's Office (CCSAO) and Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI);
3. Conducted daily internal briefings;
4. Communicated with alderman, activist as well as faith and community stakeholders; and,
5. Issued press releases to engage and inform the general public.

COPA received a total of 518 complaints from Friday, May 29, 2020 through October 1, 2020, that have been tied to police/citizen encounters during a "protest" related event.

These complaints include allegations of excessive force, verbal abuse, improper search and seizure, as well as unlawful denial or right to counsel and a host of operational violations that have been referred to the Department's Bureau of Internal Affairs.

TRAINING & PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT

COPA remains committed to ensuring its staff have the requisite training to meet the demands presented and challenges associated with investigating police misconduct and building trust in civilian oversight. During the third quarter of 2020, COPA's Training and Professional Development Department (TPDD) offered 2 in-service training courses: Use of Force, and File Storage. The Monitoring Team, having found our training plans to be rigorous and thorough has approved delivery of additional Consent Decree Overview, and Affidavit Override in-service training during the fourth quarter of 2020. Lastly, according to the Independent Monitoring Report (2), COPA's Training and Professional Development Department has received a preliminary compliance.

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INVESTIGATIVE DATA ANALYSIS

To fulfill the requirements of COPA's enabling ordinance (MCC 2-78-150), the agency queried relevant databases in which complaint and operational data is recorded to retrieve the information analyzed for this report covering the period from July 1, 2020 through September 30, 2020. The reported data is as accurate as possible as of September 30, 2020. However, information stored in the database can change as an investigation progresses. For example, an allegation category may change as an investigation uncovers additional evidence, or a case previously concluded may be reopened. Data herein is presented in an order similar to COPA's investigative process: received complaints and notifications, pending investigations and concluded investigations.


INTAKE

It is important to note that COPA can only report on the complaints and notifications it receives—it cannot account for individuals who have, or believed they have, experienced Department misconduct, but have not filed a complaint or the conduct did not generate a notification to COPA. Therefore, with respect to COPA's intake, all numbers represent the number of reported complaints and notifications of actual or perceived misconduct. COPA's intake process documents the number of complaints received but there may be multiple allegations of misconduct contained in a single complaint.

Complaints and Notifications

In the third quarter of 2020, COPA received 1512 complaints and notifications for investigation. This is a 2% increase from Q3 2019 (1482) and 0.53% increase from Q2 2020 (1504). Of the total intake, 1059 fell outside of COPA's investigative jurisdiction and were referred to the Bureau of Internal Affairs (BIA). The complaints referred to BIA included criminal conduct, operational violations not involving civilian contact, or other less serious complaints not otherwise within the jurisdiction of COPA.


At the end of third quarter, **COPA had retained 453 complaints and notifications for investigation**, a 22% decrease over Q3 2019 (584) and 23% decrease from Q2 2020 (591).



Allegations by Category

In Q3 2020, of the 453 complaints within COPA's jurisdiction, there were 775 allegations of misconduct. Of the total allegations, **fourth amendment/improper search and seizure and excessive force violations represented 39% and 31%** respectively. These categories continue to represent the largest percentage of the complaint allegations retained for investigation on a quarterly basis.


ALLEGATIONS UNDER

Complaints and Notifications by District

Districts 1 (Central) had the highest number of complaints and notifications under COPA's jurisdiction during Q3 2020. This was attributed to the high number of complaints related to protest events that occurred in the Chicago downtown area in July and August. The table and map below display the geographic distribution of intake under COPA's jurisdiction.

Affidavits

State law and applicable collective bargaining agreements require that, in most instances, a sworn Affidavit be signed by the complainant when an allegation of misconduct is made against a Department member. In signing the Affidavit, the complainant is stating under oath or affirmation that the allegation made is true and correct.

COPA attempts to secure an Affidavit from the person filing a complaint. In so doing, COPA will seek to meet/contact with the complainant in person, by phone, mail, social media and email. If COPA is unable to identify the complainant, COPA may conduct a canvass of the area where the incident occurred, speak with witnesses and follow other leads. Where COPA is unable to obtain an Affidavit in support of a complaint, and independent and corroborating evidence is found suggesting that a full investigation is warranted, COPA's Chief Administrator may request an Affidavit Override from the BIA Chief. In support of such a request, the Chief Administrator will provide the BIA Chief with objective, verifiable evidence that the investigation should continue, which may include obtaining arrest and case reports, medical records, statements of witnesses and complainants, video and audio recordings, and photographs. If the BIA Chief concurs with the Chief Administrator that continued investigation of the allegation is necessary and lawful, even without a complainant's Affidavit, the BIA Chief will execute a sworn Affidavit and COPA investigation will proceed. On the other hand, if the BIA Chief disagrees that continued investigation is warranted, then the complaint is concluded. The process is similar for complaints retained by BIA for lack of a signed Affidavit.



PENDING INVESTIGATIONS

At the conclusion of this quarter, COPA had 1948 misconduct complaints under investigation. This is a 14% increase from the same period last year (1727 pending complaints) and 5% increase from Q2 2020 (1849 pending complaints).

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
OFFICER INVOLVED SHOOTINGS (OIS)

In this quarter, COPA received 17 notifications of officer involved shootings: 12 were non-contacts, 3 involved non-fatal injuries and 2 involved fatalities. COPA concluded 14 OIS investigations during the quarter: 2 resulted in Sustained finding that the shooting did not comply with CPD's Use of Force policies, 1 was Not Sustained, 1 was placed in Close Hold and 10 were found to be consistent, within CPD's Use of Force Policies. The figures shown below exclude firearm discharges related to animal shootings, accidental firearm discharges and officer suicides.



CONCLUDED INVESTIGATIONS

During the third quarter, **COPA concluded a total of 329 investigations**, a 12% decrease from Q3 2019 (375). Of these investigations, 60 were concluded with findings and 269 were concluded without findings.




Investigations Concluded with Finding

A “finding” is determined when after a fair, thorough, independent investigation, sufficient proof is obtained to warrant a determination that one of the four categories shown below applies.

COPA makes investigative findings of Sustained and Not Sustained based on the “Preponderance of Evidence” standard in which the evidence must show it is “more likely than not” that the incident did or did not occur as alleged. However, in accordance with the March 1, 2019 Consent Decree, findings of Unfounded and Exonerated must be supported by “Clear and Convincing” evidence. Clear and Convincing evidence is a higher standard than Preponderance of Evidence, but less than “Beyond a Reasonable Doubt.” These findings are elaborated below.


- **Sustained:** The allegation was supported by sufficient evidence (“Preponderance”) to justify disciplinary action. Recommendations of disciplinary action may range from Violation Noted, to Suspension, to Separation from the Department.
- **Not Sustained:** The allegation is not supported by sufficient evidence (“Preponderance”) to prove or disprove the allegation.
- **Unfounded:** The allegation was not supported based on facts revealed through investigation, or the reported incident did not occur, as shown by “Clear and Convincing Evidence.”
- **Exonerated:** The incident occurred, but the action taken by the officer was lawful and proper, as shown by “Clear and Convincing Evidence.”

During the third quarter, COPA concluded **60 investigations with findings on 201 allegations of misconduct**. Of the 201 allegations, 25% or 50 were Sustained, a 14% increase from Q3 2019. **COPA recommended Separation for 4 Department members with Sustained allegations.**



Investigations Concluded Without Finding


COPA strives to conclude full and thorough investigations and reach findings, but there exist circumstances when closing an investigation without reaching one of the above findings is the most appropriate, reasonable or only available conclusion. These cases are noted as “Concluded Without Finding.” During this quarter, COPA concluded **269 investigations without findings**. Of the total investigations concluded without findings, 48.7% were closed for lack of sufficient independent evidence to meet the standard for an affidavit override.



Length of Investigation

COPA strives to conclude its investigations within six months of receiving a complaint of alleged misconduct or a notification from CPD of the incident for investigation. Pursuant to Chicago Ordinance MCC 2-78-135, when COPA is unable to conclude its investigation within six months, notice to the complainant and Department member who is the subject of an investigation, must be provided including the general reasons for a delay in closing the investigation within the six-month time period. Some investigations, such as OIS incidents and Excessive Force cases, may conclude beyond the six-month timeframe as they are, by nature, more complex, often involving more parties, and require an intricate analysis of collected evidence.

Of the 329 concluded investigations, **53% or 176 were completed within 6 months** and 26% were completed between 6 and 12 months. Overall, **79% of closed cases were concluded in less than one year.**



ADDITIONAL DATA REPORTING

TRANSPARENCY EFFORTS

Since the enactment of the City's Video Release Policy in 2016, COPA has released certain evidentiary materials collected during investigations of OIS incidents and of any incident resulting in death or great bodily harm occurring while in police custody or as a result of Taser discharge. Pursuant to the City's Video Release Policy, and subject to legal restrictions, **COPA released such materials as were permitted by law for 12 investigations**. The table below reflects the investigations for which materials were released in this quarter, including releases that have been delayed due to an extension request made to the City or a third party, and/or withheld because of a court order, if any.

REFERRALS

COPA may partially or fully refer a matter to another agency for a variety of reasons. For example, if COPA determines in the course of preliminary investigation that the accused member is actually a member of a police department other than the Chicago Police Department, COPA fully refers the matter to the responsible employer. A partial referral occurs when COPA retains its administrative investigation, but shares certain information with another agency, for instance, when COPA's investigation reveals potential criminal violations. In accordance with COPA's ordinance, COPA may also refer complaints to the City of Chicago Office of Inspector General

In the table below, the first column displays the name of each unit in which at least one member has been the subject of a complaint. The second column lists the number of members who were the subject of the number of complaints listed in the third column. So, the first line would be understood as: "Of members assigned to 1st District, 38 members each has 1 complaint, 6 members each has 2 complaints, 2 members each has 3 complaints, 1 member has 4 complaints and 1 member has 7 complaints." Totals are the sums of number of members multiplied by number of complaints.
