SUMMARY REPORT OF INVESTIGATION¹

I. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

At 11:00 a.m. on May 30, 2017, officers from the 11th District went to to serve an arrest warrant on Juvenile Upon their arrival, fled to the second floor and hid in his mother's bedroom closet. As Sgt. Edward Heidewald and Officers Raymond Urbanski and John Lipka pulled from the closet, he was kicking and screaming. The officers attempted to place him in handcuffs on his mother's bed. continued to scream vulgarities, kick, bite, and spit at the officers as they attempted to arrest him. During the struggle, Sgt. Heidewald grabbed a pillow from the bed and held it in front of face to shield himself from spit and attempts to bite him. The officers and transported him to the 11th District station, where he continued to act subdued belligerently and spat at Officer Andrew Neberieza. Officers took to Stroger Hospital for medical clearance before he was released to a juvenile detention facility.

V. INVESTIGATION³

a. Interviews

In his September 7, 2017, statement to COPA,⁴ Subject stated that on May 30, 2017, he was on the first floor of his family's house at The police ran upstairs and hid in his mother's bedroom closet. The arrived to arrest him, so and entered the bedroom with their Tasers drawn. The officers officers ran after ordered him to come out of the closet with his hands up, and complied. Once he exited the closet, the officers threw face down on his mother's bed. stated that he "talked mess" to the officers and called them "bitches." One of the officers took a bed pillow and placed it over face. uncle, snatched the pillow away from the officers and told them that they did not have the right to do that. said he could not breathe when the pillow was over his face. He also said he was already out of breath from running from the officers and had bronchitis at the time. **Manual Manual And Striking**, kicking or spitting at any officer. The officers placed in handcuffs and took him to the 11th District station.

Once they were at the station, the officers kept handcuffed in a room while they processed his arrest. Two black officers came into the room with called these officers "bitches and hos," then the taller officer punched in the stomach. struck him on his forehead, scratched his chest, and choked him. said he could barely breathe when the officer had his hands around neck. stated he threw up and was dehydrated and out of breath. Officers then transported to Stroger Hospital for treatment. added that an investigator from the Cook County Public Defender's office took photos of his injuries, which included a knot on his forehead and scratches on his chest. did not know the names of any of the officers, including the officer who placed a pillow over his face or the tall, black officer who struck him at the station.

In her August 2, 2017, statement to COPA,⁶ **Complainant** stated that on May 30, 2017, several police officers arrived at her family's house with an arrest warrant for her son, manufacture from the officers and hid upstairs in manufacture bedroom

closet. and the officers followed into her bedroom, saw the police holding Tasers, so she told her son to come out of the closet and stop fighting. Once he exited the closet, started to move around by twisting side to side. told him to stop moving and let the police arrest him. saw the officers "rough up" throw him face up on her bed, and then smother him with a pillow. brother told the officers to get the pillow off face. The officers turned over onto his stomach, then placed him in handcuffs and took him out of the house. Later that day, received a He told her that when he got to the police station, two black officers phone call from jumped him and hit him in the face and stomach. went to the 11th District and filed a did not know any of the officers' names. complaint against the officers.

In his March 26, 2018, statement to COPA,⁷ Accused Sgt. Edward Heidewald stated that with Officers Raymond Urbanski and John Lipka⁸ on May 30, 2017, he went to to serve an arrest warrant on Sgt. Heidewald waited at the front of the house while Officers Urbanski and Lipka went around back. A few moments later, opened the front door and directed Sgt. Heidewald upstairs to her bedroom. When Heidewald arrived on the second floor, he heard Officers Urbanski and Lipka yelling at to stop resisting and show them his hands. Once he entered the bedroom, Sgt. Heidewald saw half out of his mother's closet, flailing his arms at Officers Urbanski and Lipka. Sgt. Heidewald helped the officers remove from the closet. They moved to his mother's bed and placed him in handcuffs in the front of his body. Sgt. Heidewald stated that the bedroom was very small and that were very close together when they were on the bed. the officers and continued to flail and then started spitting at the officers. Sgt. Heidewald placed his hand between mouth to block the spit, which prompted to try to bite Sgt. himself and Heidewald. To prevent from biting him or the other officers, Sgt. Heidewald grabbed a bed pillow with his fist and held it in front of face. Sgt. Heidewald further stated that he was very close to when he held the pillow between himself and mouth. He estimated that he used the pillow as a shield for approximately one and a half seconds until Officer Lipka rolled onto his stomach. then kicked Sgt. Heidewald as the officers restrained until help arrived. Sgt. Heidewald said it took about one minute out of the closet, onto the bed, and under control. to get

Officers transported **Conducted** to the 11th District station, where Sgt. Heidewald conducted a custodial search. He related that **Conducted** was yelling and screaming at officers at the station. Once Sgt. Heidewald left the room, **Conducted** continued yelling and screaming. Officer Andrew Neberieza went into the room with **Conducted** and **Conducted** by spitting a wad of saliva and phlegm at him. An Evidence Technician photographed **Conducted** Officers Urbanski and Lipka, and the filing cabinet spattered with saliva.

In his March 16, 2018, statement to COPA,⁹ Accused Officer Raymond Urbanski provided essentially the same account as Sgt. Heidewald. He added that while he and Officer

Lipka attempted to extricate from his mother's closet, struck both officers around their faces and necks. Officer Urbanski sustained scratches and bruising on his face, neck, arms and hands. He also witnessed spitting at and attempting to bite Sgt. Heidewald. Officer Urbanski did not see Sgt. Heidewald smother from spitting at and biting the did observe Sgt. Heidewald use a pillow as a shield to stop from spitting at and biting the officers. Officer Urbanski denied placing a pillow over face.

In his March 19, 2018, **statement to COPA**,¹⁰ Accused Officer Ricky Page stated that on May 30, 2017, he responded to a 10-1 call¹¹ at **Sector 1**. Officer Page and his partner, Officer Graylin Watson, were one of the last cars to arrive on scene and did not have any direct interaction with **Sector 1**. Officers Page and Watson returned to the 11th District station and Officer Page offered to assist the arresting officers with paperwork in their office. Officer Page saw **Sector 1** handcuffed to a bench in the adjoining room. After helping with paperwork, Officers Page and Watson went back to their normal duties. Officer Page explained that there was no reason for them to stay at the station since it was not their case. Officer Page said he never entered the adjoining room when **Sector 1** was being held. He denied having any physical contact with **Sector 1** the 11th District station.

In his March 19, 2018, statement to COPA,¹² Accused Officer Graylin Watson provided essentially the same account as Officer Page. He denied having any physical contact with at the 11th District station.

In his March 19, 2018, statement to COPA,¹³ Witness Officer Andrew Neberieza stated at the 11th District station after his arrest. that he encountered was being kept in a holding room next to the office where Officer Neberieza was filling out unrelated was yelling and screaming. Officer Neberieza thought that talking with paperwork. someone new might calm so he went into the holding room and asked ifhe didn't respond, so Officer Neberieza stood next to a filing cabinet and was okay. resumed screaming and cursing, stood up, cleared his throat, and spit a wad of waited. phlegm and saliva towards Officer Neberieza. The saliva landed on the filing cabinet. Officer Neberieza then walked out of the room and went to another office to complete his paperwork. Officer Neberieza added that he believed Officers Page and Watson may have been in the office with him for a short while, but he did not observe either officer enter the holding room or have contact with

b. Digital Evidence

Evidence Technician ("ET") Photos of Officer Urbanski¹⁴ depict bruising on his face and neck, as well as scratches on his arms and hands. **ET Photos of Officer Lipka**¹⁵ shows scratches on his arm. **ET Photos of Technology** show him handcuffed to a bench. There

is a red mark on his forehead. **ET Photos of a filing cabinet**¹⁷ depict a wad of saliva and phlegm resting on its top surface.

Photos of taken by Cook County Public Defender employee on May 31, 2017, show scratches on his arms, and a laceration on his right wrist and clavicle.

c. Physical Evidence

Medical records¹⁹ from Stroger Hospital reveal that was brought to the hospital on May 30, 2017, around 1:30 p.m. to obtain medical clearance before going to a detention facility. The second to hospital staff that he had gotten into a scuffle with the police. He said he struck his head while scuffling, which caused dizziness. He also revealed that he sustained abrasions on his ribs and right shoulder during the scuffle. He said denied any direct blows to his body and stated that he had smoked $K2^{20}$ earlier in the day.

d. Documentary Evidence

The related CPD reports²¹ provide essentially the same account of the events as the officers' statements.

OEMC Event Query 1715006299²² reveals that on May 30, 2017, at 11:00 a.m. Beat 1163D (Officer Urbanski) radioed dispatch with a 10-1, relating that officers required assistance with a combative arrestee at **Event**.

VI. ANALYSIS

COPA recommends a finding of **EXONERATED** for Allegation #1 against Sgt. Heidewald, and **UNFOUNDED** for all allegations against Officers Urbanski, Page, and Watson.

The evidence shows that on May 30, 2017, Sgt. Heidewald and Officer Urbanski served an arrest warrant and brought **and the evidence** into custody. Although **and the evidence** striking, spitting at, or kicking the officers, his own mother's testimony indicates that he physically resisted. Furthermore, the photographic evidence shows that Officers Urbanski and Lipka suffered scratches and bruising throughout their upper bodies, which supports the officers' claim that **and the evidence** striking against them. The photos also document **and the evidence** spitting at a police officer later in the day, which bolsters Sgt. Heidewald's and Officer Urbanski's claim that it was Sgt. Heidewald who held a pillow in front of **and the evidence**. Therefore, Allegation #1

against Officer Urbanski is **Unfounded**. As for Sgt. Heidewald, he offered a reasonable explanation for placing a pillow in front of **Sector of** face. Namely that **Sector of** was spitting and attempting to bite officers, and Sgt. Heidewald wanted to shield himself and the others from **Sector of** attack. The scuffle in **Sector of** bedroom took place quickly and in very tight quarters, so it is understandable that a bystander might mistake Sgt. Heidewald's actions as smothering instead of holding a pillow in front of **Sector of** face for protection. **Sector** bronchitis and/or asthma, and the fact that he had just run up a flight of stairs and engaged in a physical struggle, can explain his claim that he could not breathe when the pillow was over his face. Given the totality of the circumstances, Sgt. Heidewald's use of a pillow was an appropriate defense tactic and Allegation #1 against him is **Exonerated**.

Regarding all allegations against Officers Page and Watson, the evidence casts light on the claim that a tall black officer punched, choked, and struck him on the veracity of forehead. Medical records from that afternoon document version of events to medical staff, wherein he recounted that he had been in a scuffle with police, bumped his head during the scuffle (which explains the red mark on his forehead), and then denied any direct blows to his body. Further, admitted that he smoked K2 that day, which is an illicit drug that can cause vomiting, agitation, confusion, and hallucinations. claim to COPA that he vomited, was dehydrated, and had trouble breathing while at the police station may be attributable to his K2 use and asthma diagnosis. Officer Neberieza was present while was in the holding room and he denied witnessing any officer strike Additionally, Officers Page and Watson were consistent with one another, and offered a plausible version of events when they explained that they were at the 11th District station briefly before going back out on duty. Because denied any direct blows to his body to medical staff, in addition to his belligerent behavior and intoxicated state, the officers' version of events is more credible and the allegations against Officers Page and Watson are therefore Unfounded.

VII. CONCLUSION
