#### I. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

was upset with and attempted to stab her with an ice pick. A passerby intervened, and called 911. Police officers arrived, and unsuccessfully attempted to place him under arrest. Field Training Officer Carla Jackson ("FTO Jackson") arrived on scene and engaged for approximately thirty minutes. FTO Jackson and the other officers on scene used multiple de-escalation techniques to calm and place him in handcuffs without using force.

The officers stopped for approximately thirty minutes. FTO Jackson and the other officers on scene used multiple de-escalation techniques to calm are increasingly agitated. FTO Jackson deployed her Taser once, hitting for the other officers on scene placed him in handcuffs. Paramedics transported to the hospital for psychiatric treatment.

alleges that FTO Jackson's actions amounted to excessive force. COPA reviewed this allegation.



#### V. INVESTIGATION 1

#### a. Interviews

to walk away and continually threatened the officers. In her August 17, 2018 statement to COPA, Accused Field Training Officer Carla Jackson stated that on June 28, 2018, she responded to a call of a man with a knife. When she arrived on scene she observed standing in the grass surrounded by several officers. As they approached FTO Jackson's partner<sup>5</sup> recovered the ice pick that used to accost FTO Jackson observed yelling and refusing to follow the officers' commands. FTO Jackson introduced herself to and began conversing with told FTO Jackson that he wanted to get on his bicycle and leave. FTO Jackson noticed a knife in pocket, so she requested that lower his voice, speak to her directly, and then asked him if she could take his knife. At first, refused to give up his knife, but FTO Jackson convinced him to toss it on the ground. asked for a cigarette. so FTO Jackson asked everyone on scene if they had one. No police personnel on scene had a cigarette, so FTO Jackson got one from a bystander. Another officer offered of water. FTO Jackson noticed that was rambling, which indicated to her that he may have been having a mental health episode. FTO Jackson called for an ambulance so would have the option of being transported somewhere by non-CPD personnel. Other officers on scene took turns speaking to but he did not calm down. He threatened the officers, saying things like, "I've already had two batteries against officers," and "I've already disarmed officers." He also lunged at FTO Jackson but did not strike her. tried to the leave the scene, and at one point regained control of his bicycle. FTO Jackson convinced him to put his bicycle down before he could leave. She noticed that sweating profusely and was not calming down. This indicated to her that was becoming more agitated. FTO Jackson stated she observed attempting to flee, so she deployed fell onto a grassy parkway, and other officers on scene placed him in her Taser at him. was handcuffed, he told FTO Jackson that he would sue her. handcuffs. As soon as The paramedics then placed on a stretcher and transported him to Loretto Hospital for mental health treatment. FTO Jackson stated that she spoke with for over 30 minutes before deploying her Taser. She said she used numerous de-escalation techniques, but only became more agitated. FTO Jackson also said that she has taken numerous Crisis Intervention Training (CIT) courses, including special classes in dealing with mental health situations. She explained some of the de-escalation techniques she used, such as having different officers take turns speaking to using time and distance, and offering a cigarette and a bottle of water. FTO Jackson also said that she noticed became agitated when arrived on scene. She view so he would not be agitated by her had another officer move out of presence. FTO Jackson also stated that the officers on scene blocked traffic and re-routed CTA buses during morning rush hour to give room to roam around. FTO Jackson explained that she decided to deploy her Taser because, based on her CIT training and 27 years of police experience, there was nothing else they could do. She said she did not know if

offender, someone in need of mental health treatment, or both. As far as FTO Jackson was concerned, was an active resister who was not following her verbal commands and could harm himself or others if he walked away. She said she used her professional decision to deploy her Taser and get help.

# b. Digital Evidence

**Body-worn camera footage**<sup>6</sup> from numerous officers captured the incident. The footage shows essentially the same events as those described by FTO Jackson in her COPA statement. When FTO Jackson arrived on scene, there were already multiple officers present. highly agitated and acting aggressively. FTO Jackson approached and spoke to him in a calm voice. She convinced take a knife he had on his pants and toss it on the ground. Then, they conversed for about ten minutes before became even more agitated. FTO Jackson asked him if he would be willing to go see a doctor, and refused. FTO Jackson walked away to call for an ambulance and give a different officer the opportunity to speak with She then approached another officer on scene and asked him to move down the street. As other officers attempted to de-escalate the situation with FTO Jackson approached bystanders and obtained a cigarette for as he requested. FTO Jackson the cigarette, but he refused to take it. Another officer offered bottle of water, but he refused to take that, too. walked back and forth and into the street. Officers directed traffic away from to give him room to pace. picked up his bicycle and pushed it in the direction of some of the officers. The officers took the bicycle away from but did not use any force or place him in handcuffs. Various officers took turns speaking to in calm voices for another ten minutes. Then, as FTO Jackson detailed in her COPA statement, moved toward an opening between two officers just before she deployed her Taser. fell onto a grassy parkway and officers placed him in handcuffs. Throughout the handcuffing procedure, stated that he was going to sue. Once in handcuffs, the officers placed onto a stretcher and paramedics transported him to Loretto Hospital.

## c. Physical Evidence

The Chicago Fire Department Ambulance Report<sup>8</sup> from Ambulance 23 reveals that when paramedics arrived on scene, refused to get into the ambulance and was verbally aggressive. Paramedics heard threaten the officers on scene by stating, "I'll end you if you touch me," and heard him repeatedly say, "You'll have to kill me to get me to go in that ambulance." The paramedics were on scene for 20 minutes before FTO Jackson deployed her Taser. They also noted that was not injured by the Taser deployment.

## d. Documentary Evidence

also complained that the officers choked him while they were placing him in handcuffs. The body-worn camera footage definitively proves that the officers did not choke As such, it is not necessary for them to address this allegation in any way.

The **Original Case Incident Report**<sup>9</sup> provides essentially the same account of events as and FTO Jackson. FTO Jackson's **Tactical Response Report**<sup>10</sup> states that FTO Jackson deployed her Taser at because he resisted attempts to place him in handcuffs and was attempting to flee.

FTO Jackson's **Taser Download Report**<sup>11</sup> indicates that she deployed her Taser once at 7:58 a.m.

**OEMC Event Query 1817903120**<sup>12</sup> documented that called 911 at 7:16 a.m. and reported that her cousin was trying to attack her with an ice pick.

#### VI. ANALYSIS

COPA recommends a finding of **EXONERATED** for Allegation 1 against FTO Jackson.

Whether FTO Jackson deployed her Taser at matter of whether FTO Jackson's Taser deployment was an appropriate use of force considering all relevant evidence. CPD Policy dictates that an officer may deploy a Taser against active resisters and assailants. CPD defines an active resister as, "a person who attempts to create distance between himself or herself and the member's reach with the intent to avoid physical control and/or defeat the arrest," while assailants are defined as, "a subject who is using or threatening the use of force against another person or himself/herself which is likely to cause physical injury." Additionally, CPD's Use of Force Policy specifies that, "members will continually assess situations and...determine the authorized force option based on the totality of the circumstances." Moreover, CPD policy requires that officers responding to incidents involving persons in need of mental health treatment will, "use every possible means to verbally de-escalate the situation before resorting to the use of equipment, physical restraints, or other use of force options..."

When weighing the totality of the circumstances, FTO Jackson's Taser deployment was a permissible and appropriate use of force under CPD policy. The officers on scene, and in particular FTO Jackson, employed numerous de-escalation techniques in a creditable attempt to place in handcuffs and obtain mental health treatment without using force. Despite their best efforts, refused to cooperate with the officers. Indeed, the body-worn camera footage shows that seemed to become more agitated as time progressed. Further, actively resisted the officers by refusing to comply and attempting to leave the scene. CPD Policy

permits officers to deploy their Tasers at active resisters and assailants.<sup>18</sup> Finally, the officers used every possible means they had at their disposal on scene to de-escalate the situation with before FTO Jackson resorted to using force, as required by CPD policy. Considering the totality of the circumstances, FTO Jackson's use of force was within policy, and Allegation 1 is **EXONERATED**.

## VII. CONCLUSION

Based on the analysis set forth above, COPA makes the following findings:

FTO Carla Jackson  1. It is alleged that on or about June 28, 2018, at approximately 7:55 a.m., at or near 4650 W. Harrison Street, FTO Carla Jackson deployed her Taser at in violation of Rules 8 and 9.
