

## I. ALLEGATIONS

#### II. SUMMARY OF EVIDENCE<sup>1</sup>



COPA's preliminary investigation revealed that on August 12, 2020, at approximately 10:00 p.m., accused police officers James Hunt and Jose Lopez encountered in the vicinity of 1717 W. Pershing Rd., Chicago IL.<sup>2</sup> The CPD members conducted a traffic stop and issued a citation for improper lane usage.

There is no in car camera (ICC) nor body worn camera (BWC) video of the encounter between CPD members and COPA confirmed that neither officer was issued BWC at the time of this incident. <sup>3</sup> There is no Office of Emergency Management Communications (OEMC) record of the encounter or events leading up to or after the encounter between CPD members and A search of CPD Leads database revealed that a search of a license plate and driver's license in the related area was conducted by Officer Hunt. <sup>5</sup>
COPA personnel requested a copy of the citation from CPD and but were unsuccessful in obtaining a copy. <sup>6</sup>
COPA investigators interviewed 7 In summary, reiterated the allegations adding further descriptions of the incident and the accused officers. was driving a Range Rover SUV, southbound on Ashland and made a right turn on Pershing Rd. Shortly thereafter he saw a CPD vehicle with activated emergency lights located behind his vehicle. He responded by pulling into and stopping in the center lane near his job. told officers, that the traffic stop would cause him to be late for his shift as a truck driver at the Department of Streets and Sanitation facility located at 1717 W. Pershing Rd. described the accused officers as rude Hispanic-looking males.
provided his commercial motor vehicle operator's license. He recalled the officers were rude and one of the officers stated, "write him a fucking ticket" and "I should fuck up your CDL license" Prior to being stopped by officers, purchased food from Popeyes Louisiana Kitchen restaurant, located 3204 S Ashland Ave. He recalled one of the officers referred to claim of being late for work and stated, "It's not our fault you stopped and got some motherfucking Popeyes." believed the officers comment was racially motivated. further accused the officers of unlawful racial profiling because he was driving a "luxury SUV and was wearing a hoodie and a facial covering" during the time of the public protests and COVID19 pandemic.
COPA investigators interviewed accused Officers Hunt and Lopez. Officer Hunt acknowledged he had been riding in the same vehicle with a partner when the encounter occurred. Officer Hunt acknowledged that he could not recall the name of his partner nor the specifics of the interaction with However, he denied being disrespectful or threatening to disqualify CDL. Furthermore, Officer Hunt denied using unlawful profiling techniques during the investigatory stop. He denied making any comment that was disrespectful or using profanity toward Officer Hunt stated he was not issued a body worn camera on the date in question.

Officer Lopez acknowledged he had been riding in the same vehicle with Officer Hunt when the encounter with occurred. He acknowledged that Officer Hunt was the primary member handling the investigation. He could not recall having said anything specific to He did not recall if he heard Officer Hunt make any comment related to profiling, profanity or rude behavior. Officer Lopez stated he was not issued a body worn camera on the date in question.

### III. ANALYSIS AND CONCLUSION

alleged that officers did not have a justification for conducting a traffic stop. After examining the available evidence, the complainant's interview and the officers' interviews, COPA has determined that the officers acted with justification.

The relevant, underlying facts of this case are straightforward — was detained during a traffic stop for improper use of lane of which refutes. Additionally, ICC and BWC video footage were not available to further allow review of any digital or visual evidence. Members are authorized to conduct a traffic stop where there is reasonable articulable suspicion or probable cause that a crime has occurred and that the subject has committed it. Illinois traffic enforcement laws state that a vehicle shall be driven as nearly as practicable entirely within a single lane and a turn signal should be used. Members based the traffic stop and the issuance of the citation on their observations, experience and training.

After careful consideration of the available facts, COPA that the traffic stop occurred, but there is insufficient evidence to determine it the stop was lawful and proper. Accordingly, COPA finds that this allegation is NOT SUSTAINED.

also alleged that officers violated CPD policy during the traffic stop when they used racial profiling. After examining the available evidence, the complainant's interview and the officers' interviews, COPA is unable to determine if the officers unlawfully used racial profiling as it relates to the traffic stop.

Based on the investigation of the complaint, COPA has determined there is insufficient evidence to prove the allegation by a preponderance of the evidence. Asserts that his wearing of a facial covering and hood sweatshirt, coupled with the fact that he was driving a luxury car and had food stereotypically associated with people of the same race, led officers to racially profile him. Face is African American; he assumes that officers observed him while driving and decided to stop him based solely on racial profiling. He admitted that he wore a facial covering. Alleges the comments regarding the food had negative connotations. However, admitted that he had the food in his vehicle and had just picked it up nearby on his way to work. Apparently, the food was visible in the vehicle and one of the officers may have commented it. But the comment appears to be related to the immediately preceding statement regarding being late for work.

#### CIVILIAN OFFICE OF POLICE ACCOUNTABILITY

After careful consideration of the available facts, COPA is unable to determine whether racial profiling occurred during the traffic stop. Accordingly, COPA finds that this allegation is NOT SUSTAINED.

further alleged that officers acted in a manner that was unbecoming of an officer. After examining the available evidence, the complainant's interview and the officers' interviews, COPA is unable to determine if the officers' exhibited behavior that was unbecoming of an officer.		
On August 13th provided an interview statement to COPA and could not identify or recall which officer made offensive or concerning statements. inability to identify which officer specifically stated the alleged racial comments and profanity counteracts and fails to support his allegation. Given that preported the incident and was interviewed the day after the alleged behavior occurred, it is not credible that he was unable to implicate which officer acted in what manner. In further alleged the officers failed to wear a face covering or masks as mandated by the City of Chicago and the Illinois Department of Public Health. The lack of supportive video or audio compounds the lack of corroborative evidence. The investigation was not conclusive as to whether either officer violated CPD policy as alleged.		
After careful consideration of the available facts, COPA is unable to determine whether the officers' committed conduct that was unbecoming of a member during the traffic stop. Accordingly, COPA finds that this allegation is NOT SUSTAINED.		
also alleged that the officers did not activate their BWC. COPA's investigation included a review of Evidence.com. <sup>12</sup> The results of the search indicated body worn camera were not issued to either officer on the date of the incident. Therefore, there was no violation of CPD policy.		
COPA has determined that the allegation that officers failed to activate their BWC camera is not factual. Accordingly, COPA finds that this allegation is UNFOUNDED.
