# II. SUMMARY OF EVIDENCE<sup>1</sup>

On October 24, 2019, ( and his friend, went to a nearby store, Smoke Times. As and exited home, they observed a couple down the alley watching them and then quickly leaving.<sup>2</sup> and exited Smoke Times, Officer Vanessa Barajas (Officer Barajas) stopped As them, asked where they were coming from because someone called about them.<sup>3</sup> Officer Barajas and said he believed the couple called the police. played the call for 4 provided his ID to Officer Barajas and provided his social security card and information. Officer Adam Jaurigue (Officer Jaurigue) remained with while Officer Barajas went to the police vehicle and ran their names. Officer Chavon Trammell and Officer John Ishaq arrived on scene. Officer Barajas returned ID and social security card and asked if they apologized to the officers for being aggressive. explained he was upset because he thought Officer Barajas profiled him but realized it was the refused the Investigatory Stop Receipt and said the officers were alright.<sup>5</sup> While couple. believed they were held for approximately twenty (20) minutes after providing identification, BWC shows the entire stop was approximately ten (10) minutes. Investigatory Stop Reports were completed for both

explained to COPA that he felt Officer Barajas' treated him and like criminals,<sup>7</sup> and detained him for too long because his ID showed he lived in the neighborhood. Both sector and sector believed they had been racially profiled.<sup>8</sup>

#### III. ANALYSIS AND CONCLUSION

COPA finds the allegation that Officer Barajas profiled and and stopped them without justification is **Exonerated**. An officer may stop any individual when the officer has reasonable grounds to believe the individual has committed or is about to commit a crime.<sup>9</sup> It is undisputed that Officer Barajas had reasonable articulable suspicion and based on a 911 call, which described to stop and as possibly committing a crime. COPA understands frustration and belief and that they were racially profiled because police stopped them for exiting home from the rear entrance and walking to a corner store to purchase items, which is normal routine.

In this case, **and and manufactures** issue is with the neighbor who reported them, not with Officer Barajas. Clearly Officer Barajas did her job by stopping **and and manufacture** within minutes of receiving the 911 information to investigate whether they committed a crime. Therefore, this allegation is **Exonerated**.

COPA finds the allegation that Officer Barajas detained and and without justification is **Exonerated**. An officer may only temporarily restrict a person's freedom of movement as long as reasonably necessary to dispel or confirm the member's Reasonable Articulable Suspicion of criminal activity.<sup>10</sup> As discussed above, Officer Barajas had reasonable articulable suspicion to believe and member were the subjects of a 911 call. The detention lasted less than ten minutes. Time was prolonged because Officer Barajas played the OEMC call for members because he did not believe that he matched a description. The name checks also took longer due to members only possessing a social security card requiring further inquiry to confirm his identity. Officer Barajas released members and members as hort period of time after she determined they were not involved in the commission of a crime. Therefore, this allegation is **Exonerated**.
