II. SUMMARY OF EVIDENCE¹

On December 14, 2019, at approximately 6:00 p.m., Officer Cynthia Carrion (Officer Carrion) and Officer Nicholas Reno (Officer Reno) stopped and explained that his license plate was not properly illuminated. Officers Carrion and Reno, immediately, asked if he smoked because they smelled cannabis. denied smoking cannabis, but admitted he just dropped off his friend who did smoke. Officer Carrion told to step out of

complied and moved to the back of his vehicle with Officer Reno. While Officer Carrion searched the vehicle, showed his lights were on by squatting down to the ground and looking up at the lights. Officer Carrion came around the rear of the vehicle, bent over and looked up at the lights, using her flashlight. Officer Carrion acknowledged the dim light and stated they have to be brighter. Officers Carrion and Reno stated, from their perspective they could not see the light. Said he understood, later admitted he did not know the lights were dim, but continued to argue the officers pulled him over for no reason. After running name, Officer Carrion told they had to take him in because his license is suspended. Officer Reno explained his vehicle would be impounded because his license was suspended.

III. ANALYSIS AND CONCLUSION

without justification is **Exonerated**. According to Illinois State law and Chicago Municipal Code, every motor vehicle shall be illuminated so that the license plate is clear and legible at a distance of fifty feet. While argues that he should not have been stopped because both his license plate light bulbs were lit, the officers stated it needed to be brighter. Prior to being stopped, in-car camera video captured wehicle beside an unknown vehicle and shows the unknown vehicle's license plate is clearly illuminated but sis dark. Therefore, wehicle was not in compliance with State law or Municipal Code, and Officers Carrion and Reno were within CPD policy when they stopped Thus, this allegation against Officers Carrion and Reno is **Exonerated**.

in his COPA interview, stated he believed Officer Carrion was hostile, profiled him as a gang member because she asked where he was going and if he had a gang affiliation, and she was trying to meet a monthly quota by stopping him. Contrarily, BWC shows Officer Carrion was professional and explained multiple times to why he was stopped, why his vehicle was searched and why he was being taken to the station. At one point, Officer Carrion acknowledged thinks he is being treated unfairly, but she is just doing her job.
