

SUPPLEMENTAL FINAL SUMMARY REPORT

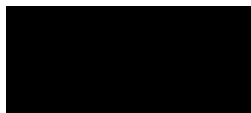
This Supplemental Final Summary Report reflects the agreement reached by COPA and the Superintendent of the Chicago Police Department (“CPD”) following discussions¹ on COPA’s findings and disciplinary recommendations regarding **Police Officers Brian Burak #18457, Daniel Grasz #15652, Eduardo Hernandez #6838, Michael Tanon #6300, and Thomas Donovan #9895.**

Following COPA’s issuance of its FSR, COPA provided the final disciplinary file related to COPA’s recommendations to CPD. On January 7, 2026, pursuant to M.C.C. §2-178-130(a), CPD issued a non-concurrence as to certain findings related to this log number.

Pursuant to M.C.C. §2-78-130(a)(iii), COPA and CPD engaged in discussions regarding the Superintendent’s non-concurrence. COPA maintains the initial findings recommendations are appropriate. Based on a discussion of applicable law, the burden of proof, the facts and available evidence in this case, and in the interests of settlement, the parties agreed as follows:

- The allegation that Officer Burak committed misconduct by seizing and/or facilitating the seizure of [REDACTED] backpack is Not Sustained.
- The allegation that Officer Burak committed misconduct by searching and/or facilitating the search of [REDACTED] backpack is Not Sustained.
- The allegation that Officer Grasz committed misconduct by conducting and/or facilitating an improper patdown search of [REDACTED] is Not Sustained.
- The allegation that Officer Hernandez committed misconduct by seizing and/or facilitating the seizure of [REDACTED] backpack is Not Sustained.
- The allegation that Officer Hernandez committed misconduct by searching and/or facilitating the search of [REDACTED] backpack is Not Sustained.
- The allegation that Officer Tanon committed misconduct by searching and/or facilitating the search of [REDACTED] backpack is Not Sustained.
- The allegation that Officer Tanon committed misconduct by failing to provide stop receipt to [REDACTED] is Not Sustained.
- The allegation that Officer Donovan committed misconduct by failing to provide a stop receipt to [REDACTED] is Not Sustained.
- The allegation that Officer Donovan committed misconduct by failing to document the investigatory stop of Taronn [REDACTED] with an Investigatory Stop Report is Not Sustained.
